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<u>St Barnabas' Primary School Offer for SEND –</u> <u>Special Educational Needs and Disabilities</u> <u>Parent / Carer's Questions and Answers</u>

I. Who are the best people to talk to at St Barnabas Primary about my child's difficulties with learning, special educational needs or disability?

> Talk to your child's class teacher about your concerns.

 \succ Your child's class teacher is likely to discuss your concerns with the school **SENCo**, Lauren **Castle**. If you wish, you can make an appointment with the SENCo to discuss your concerns further.

> If you continue to have concerns about your child's difficulties with learning, special educational needs or disability, you should arrange to discuss these with **Mrs Sarah Maltese**, the **Executive Headteacher**.

2. How will the school let me know if they have any concerns about my child's learning, special educational needs or disability?

 \succ Your child's class teacher may initially speak to you at the beginning or end of the school day. They may then arrange a time with you to discuss concerns in greater detail.

> Class teachers may speak to you at Parent Teacher meetings.

 \succ The SENCo may attend parent teacher meetings or contact parents directly to find out more about parents' or teachers' concerns, or to offer advice.

3. How will the school consider my views and those of my child with regard to <u>her/his</u> difficulties with learning, special educational needs or disabilities?

> At St Barnabas Primary, we believe it is very important for parents and carers to be involved in all areas of their child's learning and we actively encourage discussion. We also believe, where possible, in getting your child's views on may difficulties they may experience with their learning.

> You will be able to share your views and discuss your child's progress at Parent Teacher meetings and through regular discussion with your child's class teacher.

 \succ If your child has an identified Special Educational Need (SEN), you will be invited to a termly meeting with the class teacher and SENCo to discuss current progress, support strategies being used and expected outcomes.

 \succ If your child has a EHCP (Educational, Health & Care) plan you and your child will be given the opportunity to share your views at the Annual Review.

<u>4. How does St Barnabas Primary School ensure the teaching staff are</u> <u>appropriately trained to support my child's special educational needs and / or</u> <u>disability?</u>

 \succ At St Barnabas Primary, we believe that your child's learning needs will first be met through the high quality teaching delivered by their class teacher.

 \succ We regularly review the school training schedule and professional development for all teaching and support staff to ensure there is appropriate expertise to support children with special educational needs and disabilities.

> The school is able to access training programmes from different organisations including the Triborough Training and Outreach Team based at Queen Elizabeth II School.

> Individualised training for teaching and support staff is organised as necessary to support children with particular special educational needs or disabilities.

 \succ Where appropriate we like to invite parents of children with special conditions such as complex medical needs to train staff directly.

5. How will the curriculum and the school environment be matched to my child's needs?

 \succ At St Barnabas Primary, we believe that your child's learning needs will first be met through the high quality teaching delivered by their class teacher.

> We carefully plan our curriculum to match the age, ability and needs of all children.

> Each class teacher adapts their lesson planning and teaching to match your child's special educational needs and / or disability. It may be appropriate for your child's teacher to adopt different strategies or resources, or adapt outcomes to meet your child's learning needs.

> Additional specialist advice is sought when appropriate, and when necessary. The school has access to specialist advice from Advisory Teachers working in the Training and Outreach Team at Queen Elizabeth II School. Accessibility aids and technology may also be used to support your child's learning.

 \succ Please note that whilst we will make a reasonable adjustment to our premises for health needs, we may be limited by the nature of our Victorian building and our central location.

6. What types of support may be suitable and available for my child?

This depends upon the nature of your child's needs and difficulties with learning. Our educational provision will match the needs of the four broad areas of need as defined in the SEN Code of Practice 2014;

- · Communication and Interaction
- [•] Cognition and Learning
- Social, emotional and mental health
- · Sensory and / or physical needs

> At St Barnabas Primary, we have a 3 tiered approach to supporting a child's learning. <u>Universal</u> – This is the quality first teaching your child will receive from their class teacher and may include some very minor adaptations to match your child's learning needs.

<u>Targeted</u> – It may be appropriate to consider making additional, short- term, special educational provision to remove or reduce any obstacles to your child's learning. This takes the form of a graduated four part approach of a) **assessing** your child's needs, b) **planning** the most effective and appropriate intervention, c) **providing** this intervention, and d) **reviewing** the impact on your child's progress towards individual learning outcomes.

<u>Specialist</u> It may be necessary to seek specialist advice and regular long term support from a specialist professional outside the school in order to plan for the best possible learning outcomes for your child. This may include educational psychology, speech and language therapy, occupational therapy, physiotherapy, sensory advisory teachers and the child development service. The school may need to prioritise referrals to these services however, for a small number of pupils access to these specialists may be through and EHCP (Education, Health Care Plan).

> The current interventions provided at St Barnabas Primary include:

- Speech and Language Therapist (external)
- Occupational Therapist (external)
- Educational Psychologist (external partnership)
- Speech and Language interventions
- Social Stories

7. How will you support my child to reach his / her learning outcomes?

 \succ The Class Teacher and other staff working with your child ensure that your child receives appropriate teaching and support in order to reach their goals. Your child's learning plan, strategies to support your child and progress will be reviewed termly.

> External agencies and specialists may also review your child's progress and adapt their planning accordingly.

8. What is an EHC Plan and who can request one for my child?

The purpose of an Education, Health and Care (EHC) Plan is to make special education provision to meet the special educational needs of a child or young person, to secure improved outcomes for him/her across education, health and social care and, as he/she gets older, prepare for adulthood.

An EHC Plan will contain:

- · The views and aspirations of you and your child,
- · A full description of his/her special educational needs and any health and social care needs,
- · Established outcomes for your child's progress,

 \cdot Specified provision required and how education, health and social care will work together to meet your child's needs and support the achievement of the agreed outcomes.

You and/or the school, usually the SENCo or Head of School, can request that the Local Authority conduct an assessment of your child's needs. This may lead to an EHC Plan.

9. How will you help me to support my child's learning?

> Your child's class teacher, SENCo or specialist advisors may suggest strategies or activities for you to do at home to support your child's learning.

 \succ We sometimes run parent & carer workshops on topics such as phonics or reading to help you understand the strategies used in school. In addition, we may be able to offer you individual training in specific support strategies relevant to your child.

 \succ The SENCo may also support you with strategies, resources and ideas for supporting your child's learning at home.

> You may have an opportunity to meet with other professionals involved in supporting your child.

10. How is support allocated to children and how do children move between the different levels of support in school?

> St Barnabas Primary receives funding from the Westminster Local Authority. These funds include money to support the learning of children with SEN and/or disabilities.

 \succ The Executive Headteacher, in consultation with the school Governors, decides the budget for SEN provision on the basis of the needs of the children in the school.

 \succ The Executive Headteacher and SENCo review the needs of all children in the school and organise interventions, staff training and equipment needs as appropriate so as to make the most effective use of the SEN budget.

 \succ Pupil progress is reviewed regularly, after which the effectiveness of the school's provision is also reviewed and adapted to ensure the best possible intervention is provided to those children who require additional support to learn.

11. How will the school know that the support has made a difference to my child's learning, and how can I and my child be included in this review process?

> Your child's progress will be assessed both in terms of his/her regular learning within the class and with regard to specific intervention programmes.

> At pupil progress review meetings, the impact of the support given is carefully measured to ensure that the learning outcomes have been achieved and, if not, what adaptations are necessary. It may be decided that a further period of support would be beneficial for your child.

> You and your child will be kept informed and encouraged to be actively involved at all stages of this support.

12.What support will there be for my child's happiness and wellbeing at St Barnabas Primary?

> At St Barnabas Primary, we believe that the happiness and wellbeing of all our pupils is paramount. All members of staff take this aspect of school life very seriously.

> You can be confident that in particular your child's class teacher, the teaching assistants and SENCo are available to provide support to match your child's needs.

> You should feel free to contact your child's class teacher if you have any concerns.

13. How is my child included in all the same activities as his/her peers at school?

> St Barnabas Primary is an inclusive school, and is committed to providing equal opportunities for all children.

> School clubs, educational visits and residential trips are available to all children.

> When necessary, the school will make reasonable adjustments to ensure that children with SEN and/or disabilities are included in all activities.

> You should feel free to contact your child's class teacher if you have any concerns.

14. How will St Barnabas Primary support my child in transition stages?

 \succ We liaise closely with the school or nursery your child is transferring from. We are able to discuss with the relevant teachers any individual needs and how best to support your child.

> While at St Barnabas Primary, we take care to ensure that during transition points (between classes each year and at the end of Key Stages), all staff are aware of individual pupils' needs, learning progress and best support strategies.

> St Barnabas Primary makes arrangements to ensure there is a smooth transition when your child transfers to his/her secondary school of choice.

> If your child has a EHC Plan, we will participate and/or facilitate its review in sufficient time prior to him/her moving between key phases of education. You will be kept informed of these arrangements and asked to attend the review meetings.

15. Who do I contact if I have a complaint about the SEN provision made for my child?

> Initially speak to your child's class teacher and/or the SENCo/Head of School. If your concerns are not addressed you may be directed to the school's Complaints Policy and procedure.

16. If I have other questions about my child at St Barnabas Primary who can I ask?

At St Barnabas Primary, we are very happy to speak to you about any aspects of your child's education. It is best to speak to one of the following in this order:

- · The Class Teacher
- The SENCo/Head of School
- · Executive Headteacher

17. What is the Local Offer for pupils with SEND and where can I find it?

The Local Offer is the Council's offer for parents and young people. It will include provision both in and out of school and will include services and support provided by the private and voluntary sectors as well as the Council and National Health Service. It will also include information about the arrangements for identifying and assessing children and young people's special educational needs and for requesting an Education, Health and Care (EHC) assessment. In addition, there will be information on how to raise concerns about services.
